2017 Annual Event and Winter Warm-up

Since 2012, Connecting Hope has hosted the Annual Event each fall to provide families and individuals with opportunity to receive great resources, free groceries, free winter clothing and a winter vehicle check-up. This year, more than 80 volunteers helped out as over 160 households came from Barre, East Barre, Graniteville, Washington, Orange, Berlin, and Williamstown to attend the Annual Event. Representatives from community resources and ministries offered information relating



to education, housing, child care, addiction recovery, family counseling, and spiritual guidance. Aldrich Library and The Light Radio Network joined the Annual Event for the first time this year. The Winter Warm-up was hosted by Barre Evangelical Free Church offering winter outerwear and warm clothing to the attendees. Coats were collected by Community National Bank and Kinney Drugs and many more were given by individuals. Over 200 bags of groceries were sent home with attendees. The bags were filled with dry goods such as cereal, canned fruits and vegetables, peanut butter, and pasta. Additionally, fresh produce like carrots, onions, beets, potatoes, cabbage and squash were available. Groceries were donated by Enough Ministries, individuals and Connecting Hope. Fresh squash and other produce was contributed by a local farmer and Hannaford Supermarket.



Those who drove to the Event were given opportunity to have their vehicles checked for winter preparedness. The vehicle maintenance volunteers topped off fluids and checked tires and brakes. They informed guests of issues that needed to be addressed as well. Connecting Hope is very grateful to all the volunteers and organizations that put in well over 1000 hours to make the Annual Event a success again this year. Each year, Connecting Hope looks for more organizations to join us in providing resources for families and individuals from the Barre Area.

What it means to be a Member Church of Connecting Hope

Prior to Connecting Hope, we at Christ Community Alliance Church, were, to a great extent, unaware of many of the immediate needs of our community. We mostly functioned alone, feeling overwhelmed by the needs. We attempted to address them. We were not clear what real benefit the recipient was receiving. Often, the unintended consequence was greater dependency, as the issues grew more intractable. Viewing these unresolved conditions, we struggled against fatigue and callus attitude.

While we experienced these issues, our brothers and sisters in other bodies felt much the same. One thing that I heard was how some would go from one body to another with the same complaints. In many ways, God's Church in Central Vermont was isolated from one another and often not aware or able to address these needs, the most profound being the lack of a relationship with Jesus Christ.

A key incident that forced us to rethink how we served our community occurred in 2011. While we were handing out food, I saw a few take much while many neighbors had little. One thing stood out, a man in an expensive truck loaded up his truck and took off. As we debriefed from this effort, we arrived at several conclusions that there is a need for: one a more equitable distribution of the food; two, clothes; and three, a way to utilize community services to assist our friends. It was clear that no single local body could do this alone, thus, Connecting Hope was born.

We are now addressing these needs year-round through the Hopeline and Relational Ministry. We seek to move a person through their perceived need to progressively deeper levels, to their most profound need, a relationship with Jesus Christ. Because of Connecting Hope, the member churches are now working closer together, more effectively serving others in their physical, emotional and spiritual needs. The fact that we are working together brings us closer to each other and our Lord. Indeed, this is an answer to our Savior's prayer, "that they be one."

11b for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances.
12 I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want.
13 I can do all this through him who gives me strength.

Paul would not be able to say that unless he had found what he had previously stated in verses 4-7 to be true.

4 Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!
5 Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near.
6 Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanks-giving, present your requests to God.
7 And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

That is the basis of Paul's ability to have a positive attitude no matter his circumstances. He had experienced this first hand and had found God's peace to be beyond his greatest expectations. God's peace settles the heart in whatever life dishes out – "good or not so good". And really that comes down to perspective which is influenced by knowing God in this intimate way and having genuine, quality fellowship with Him.

So as you approach this time of year or for that matter life in general, I pray you will find the same reality Paul did.

In the years following, the brothers struggled with forgiveness and grief. In time, they were able to forgive the man who accidentally shot their father and to find personal healing. Dan and Mark are now able to share their personal journey at engagements such as Wild Game dinners, men's conferences, prisons, school and church gatherings.
